A Note From YOUR VICAR

Merry Christmas!

As I write these words I know some of you want to say that it's actually 'advent' and that the season of Christmas does not really start until Christmas Day when it runs for 40 more days. That is how the church calendar runs. Now it has sort of been flipped around so that Advent has become a 25 day lead up to the 'big day' and people find January really long, difficult and cold. Who still wants Hark the Herald and mince pies by the end of boxing day?

In my head I'm mixed about this un-recent change. On the one hand, ecclesiastical pedants are annoying when they say 'ackshally' and give some arcane historical justification that should be saved for pub quizzes. I really really don't like giving in to such pickiness. This means that on a practical level I'm happy to work with the prevailing culture of celebration rather than sackcloth and ashes for Advent.

But on the other hand I see that the traditional frame of seasons has real wisdom in it. A lot of people find Christmas really difficult. Some are just a bit grumpy and wish the world would 'shush' but for others the sound and sight of merriment just seems 'off' when your own life is difficult and life for much of the world is difficult. John Lennon may sing 'war is over' every Christmas but we know it is jolly well not over, so that all of the tinsel and silly hats just seem frivolous. Advent is meant to be a time of waiting and watching for signs of hope; signs of the work of God; a time which is designed to make space to acknowledge difficulties.

I was talking with someone just last week who is having a difficult time. 'I am afraid to hope' they said. The fear of disappointment dare not let the light of hope peek through. Every year at Midnight Mass* we have this pivot point. The move from dark to light. It is impossible for humans to make that leap and for those who prefer the waiting of advent, it is possible to stay there forever. Despair seems very wise to those in her clutches. But...

The Christian story is not 'always winter, never Christmas'. The Christian story is that Christmas comes in the wintertime. The light does shine in the darkness and the darkness has not even understood it. At Christmas, we can acknowledge the cold, the dark and the difficult things of the world but we have hope because God sent his Son to us. We're not naïve but we believe. We celebrate on purpose when it's most difficult to do so.

Celebration is a discipline and disciplines require you to be purposeful about them. So Merry Christmas, my readers! Go and give thanks by doing happy things and being merry on purpose. Do something good.

May God bless you this Christmas time, even if it feels like a very long advent! **Nick**

"We are a national charity working to transform the hopes and happiness of young people facing abuse, exploitation and neglect. We support them through their most serious life challenges and we campaign tirelessly for the big social changes that will improve the lives of those who need hope most. We've been doing this for 140 years and we won't stop until we've built a society where hope is alive in every child.

We walk towards the young people that society crosses the road to avoid. We see something in these children, that something is:

Hope for a happier home life, hope of getting a job, of getting away from the people who exploit and hurt them.

Hope of overcoming the obstacles modern life puts in front of them and hope that tomorrow can be better than today.

It's right there in the centre of every young person in Britain. Even those who have it toughest of all, those who are exploited, neglected, unsafe. **We see it.**

And we fight for it.

Sometimes hope takes a battering. Sometimes it's hidden by doubt, aggression or mistrust. Sometimes it's hanging by a thread. But we know it's there.

And that's why we do everything in our power to restore it, protect it and strengthen it.

We're building hope in the young people

who need it most, through campaigning and support.

And we won't rest until we've created a society built for all children.

Where hope is alive in every child.

Because no young person should be left without it.

We fight for hope by deeply understanding the needs of young people and by supporting them through their most serious life challenges. We work with young people who have suffered years of abuse, who have run away from home or are struggling with mental health issues. We look out for young carers and those who are at risk of being groomed by criminal groups. We help refugees who have no one else to turn to in this country.

The young people we meet have complicated lives. Their experiences are always different, but young people all have one thing in common. It's a thing called hope.

Hope for a happier home life. Hope of getting a job, of getting away from the people who exploit or hurt them. So we find their hope and start there, working with them little by little, giving them whatever they need and empowering them to make decisions for the future they want.

We work with young people for as long as it takes and across all different aspects of their life as it's rarely simple for them. There might be aggression, mistrust, anger or disappointment, but even when hope is hanging by a thread we help them find it again.
